Roger Clarke at the SALTAIRE HISTORY CLUB

December's meeting of the History Club was a Christmas event to remember and very well attended. Hilary Taylor Landscape Associates (HTLA) is the firm responsible for the recent developments in Roberts Park and guest speaker Erika Diaz Peterson has been the senior consultant for the project. Her research has been exhaustive and as many original features as possible have been retained. The river was an important part of the southern aspect, and clearance of the north bank of the river has revealed a set of steps which led down to a pier. Regattas and swimming events were regularly held here in summer. In the northern half, special attention is being made to reconstruct the North Shelter as it was, and the Entrance Lodge is being renovated to become an interpretation centre which will be open to the public. A feature of Sir Titus' park was the carefully laid out flower beds in which plants were carefully labelled for the education of visitors. The new centre will also have a horticultural education centre within it. HTLA have been careful to consult with the public as the scheme has developed, especially about the new bandstand which has been specially commissioned to a striking new design. The best news was that the newly landscaped Park will be formally opened in February or March, 2010, although some of the surfacing of paths and promenades will have to wait until weather conditions are right. [Erika had to admit defeat over the origin of the stocks in the Park, which were apparently brought in from Shipley. They first appear on OS maps of the Park in the 1920s - can any *Sentinel* readers throw more light on this puzzle?]

CHARLESWORTH FAMILY SCOOPS PRIZES IN QUIZ

The second half of the evening was devoted to a Christmas Quiz – twenty questions organised and presented by Maria Glot and Sally Clegg.

Club members were divided into "families" identified on bookmarks especially made by Maria for this session, and the winning family were the Charlesworths (Eric Dinsdale, Molly Kenyon, Val Bamforth, Sandi Moore and Hattie Townsend), receiving Salts Mill pens (which have unfortunately dried up but are genuine Salts memorabilia) and a copy of "A Visitor's Guide to Saltaire" by Weber, Barlo and Shaw which is not at all dry!

TOBOGGAN TROUBLE IS NOTHING NEW

In the course of his extensive historical research, **Roger Clarke** came across a story in the *Shipley and Saltaire Times* of exactly a hundred and ten years ago which amused him so much that he wants to share it with *Sentinel* readers:

Toboggan Ride in Court in January, 1900

An action was brought in Bradford County Court by Mr Emil Carr, a waiter at the Midland Hotel, Bradford, against Mr Sam Wilson, owner of the toboggan ride on Shipley Glen. The claim was for 5 guineas to pay for damage for wearing apparel. It was alleged that on the August Bank Holiday, 1899, there had been an accident on the toboggan run when Mr Carr was thrown from the toboggan when it stopped suddenly and he was ejected "in a manner which he neither anticipated nor desired". The plaintiff's clothing was damaged but no other injury was sustained. A bill was submitted to Mr Wilson for £3-15-0d for a new suit and the old suit was returned too. In his defence, Mr Wilson said that the plaintiff had tried to travel on the toboggan with 3 colleagues, despite being warned that only 2 people were allowed in each toboggan. One of his friends got out, but Mr Carr persisted in sitting on a friend's knee when the run began. Mr Wilson had agreed to provide Mr Carr with a new pair of trousers. He also told the Court that, when the toboggan run was first built, he had asked for advice from Mr John Waugh, who had advised him to make it very strong "because you will have all kinds of apes, idiots and fools to contend with" (laughter in Court). The plaintiff was awarded £4.

STREET SIGN PROJECT

Since 1999, most of the standard black and white street signs in the Village have been replaced by distinctive dark blue and white. The signs have been funded by individual donations following an initial grant of £1500 from the Shipley Area Committee. Twenty-two signs are still needed, at a cost of £98 each. The idea came from Clive Woods, a founder member of Saltaire Village Society (SVS), and became an official project in the World Heritage Site Management Plan. SVS hopes to complete the project during 2010 – in time for the opening of a new Visitor Information Centre!
