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Roger Clarke's SALTAIRE FOLK

THE QUIET MAN BEHIND THE HISTORY CLUB

The success of Saltaire History Club owes much to Dave Shaw and his wife Ann, who work closely with staff at Shipley College Resource Centre to ensure that Club members are entertained in comfortable surroundings and suitably refreshed. Dave works tirelessly behind the scenes to oversee the development of historical research in the Village. The publication of "Balgarnie's Salt" with his colleague Philip Barlo established him as one of the Village historians, and the work is used as a seminal reference for students, historians and visitors. Dave is never precious with his historical material, believing that community involvement and team working are the best way to take historical research forward. This commitment to Saltaire has come late in Dave's career, but he has early memories of the Village. Born in Bradford, in Bradford Moor. he recalls being brought by his parents in the late 40s and 50s to visit Shipley Glen. Walking down Victoria Road with its stunning architecture, he was always conscious that this was a very special place. Returning as a teenager to read the Daily Worker in the public library which was housed in Victoria Hall, his link was again temporary. He went on to gain a degree in Mathematics at Manchester University in 1962, which led to a job with the Meteorological Office and a training year in North London. Learning about practical meteorology took him all over Britain before he landed a job at HQ in Bracknell, Berkshire and married Ann. Surprisingly Dave sees a link with Saltaire here. Bracknell was a new town, built to house London overspill, and was a socially engineered environment. Both Saltaire and Bracknell were model towns, and Dave was swift to become involved in community development. The political affiliations of his teenage years had been sharpened by boarding with a Jewish family, who were communists, in his training year. He was co-opted onto the local Parish Council and from there was elected as a Labour councillor on the Rural District Council. There were plenty of issues to be addressed, from opposition to the Fair Rent Act which raised rents for many Council house tenants, to consumer rights. He spent 10 years on the Council, within which time he and Ann had two children and Dave rose in the ranks of the Meteorological Office. He became Principal of the Met Office College, and then Head of International Relations before retirement in 2001.

His reconnection with Saltaire came in 1995. He and Ann often ventured north to visit their Bradford relatives, and heard about the New Mill conversion. Purchase of property here began their split life between Saltaire and Bracknell, where their son and three grandchildren still live. Their daughter and two other grandchildren live in Norfolk. In Saltaire, Dave was introduced to the intricacies of Village history by Clive Woods, and was also involved with Saltaire Village Society. Contact with the Salt family, especially Denys and Eva Salt, led to a fascination with the history of the Salt family, and he and Ann are now a useful link with descendants of Sir Titus who are increasingly involved in the village and events here. His fascination with the generations of textile workers who made it all happen is equally apparent, and he is as concerned with the living history of the Village as he is with its Victorian roots.

Without Dave's inspiring example of team working, his professional and meticulous historical research and presentation, and above all his drive, integrity and commitment, it is doubtful that the Saltaire history scene would be as vibrant as it is today. But always quietly, in the background and never seeking self promotion.

The next meeting of the History Club is on Thursday, June 17th, beginning, as usual, at 7pm, in the new venue, which is the Dance Exercise Room at Victoria Hall, accessed via the Lockwood Street entrance.



NOT SO SIMPLY SALT

Organisers of the Simply Saltaire exhibition were amazed when anonymous donor gave a bust of Sir Titus Salt for The bust (above) stands one foot high and is in unglazed porcelain or Parian Ware, dated 1877. As Sir Titus died on December 29^{th} , 1876 this mav have been commemorative piece. There is a similar bust in a display cabinet in the entrance to Victoria Hall.

Roger Clarke said: "The donor told us that her father had been given the bust by a very elderly lady in gratitude for his help in enabling her to continue to attend the church despite her infirmity, and for other kindness." of Nothing more is known of the old lady or her family. As the **Sentinel** goes to press, Roger is hoping the bust will appear as a feature of the BBC's Antiques Roadshow, due to be filmed in Victoria Hall on April 29th.

WORK ON CHURCH - AND WHO WILL FOOT THE BILL

With the picturesque portico of the United **Reformed Church presently** obscured scaffolding, church's the publicity officer Len Morris explains to Sentinel readers exactly what is going on and how it is being paid for: The canopy around the front of the tower is being repaired and rotting timbers replaced. The roof will be made watertight so that the stream no longer runs down through the inside via the lights when it rains, as at present! The steps will be reseated and the railings up the steps replaced. The work is being monitored and approved by English Heritage Architects to ensure that the building's heritage is

English Heritage have provided £116,000 towards the restoration that is to cost £237,000 to implement. The church, assisted by local companies and the community, has raised £40,000. £35,000 is VAT but this can be recovered from the government, leaving £6,000, which the church is confident it can raise. The next stage is to restore the windows within the church that have been vandalized over time, to repair the Mausoleum housing the remains of Sir Titus Salt and his family following deterioration with time made worse by the theft of lead during 2009 and to spruce up the statues of Sir Titus Salt in the church vestibule and the Angel Gabriel in the Mausoleum. English Heritage has already promised a grant of £125,000 towards the cost which is expected to be in excess of £200.000. The church is now at work raising funds to allow that to be achieved. The work will not stop there! The rooms below within the church are planned to be modernized to better suit the needs of visiting schools, tourists, the church and the local community. Disabled access will also be installed to the church itself and the rooms below. As a grade one listed building it is essential that the heritage of the building is preserved so this will not be a simple task. When the church is "watertight" the Heritage Lottery Fund will be prepared to discuss the possibility of a grant towards this work as will some other grant making trusts. There is always some left to be found so the fund raising will, no doubt, still be busy in 2011.

BAD LADS AND JUSTICE

Roger Clarke found this in the *Shipley Times* and *Express*, published in May, 1880:

Arthur Spencer (13) of 27, Shirley Street and John Bower (12) of 6, Amelia Street, stole property to the value of 2/- from Crabtrees, Confectioners shop in Westgate, Shipley. They gained entry down a cellar grate, and stole 6d in copper, wine, ginger beer, keys, a hairbrush, a riding whip and a cork remover. They were later found by a policeman asleep in a hamper.

[I would like to know what the policeman was doing asleep in a hamper – **Roger**]

Bower, of previously good character, was discharged with a caution. Spencer was regarded as having led him astray, and was sentenced to a period on a training ship until he should be 16 years of age.
