THE NORTH LODGE - FROM EYESORE TO HIGH SIGHT



HISTORY CLUB ENJOYED

The many people gathered the most recent for meeting of the Saltaire History Club, on March 5th enjoyed an excellent talk by Jean McAllister, to mark the occasion of her retirement as Principal of Shipley College, and were treated to specially reprinted copies of the commerative programme which celebrated the opening of the refurbished Exhibition Building by Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal in 1996.

The second half of the evening featured an informative lecture Roger Clarke on the life and works of poet Ann Moss, still hailed by some as the Saltaire Laureate (although she never actually lived in the Village) with readings brought entertainingly and very touchingly to life by actress and dramatist Harriet Townsend.

The Club is next due to meet in June, when Mr Len Morris will share his extensive knowledge of the history of Saltaire United Reformed Church. The ruined North Lodge in Milner Fields has been totally refurbished in fine style and stands proudly at the top end of the estate. <u>Peter J Bottomley</u> has been to meet the new ocupants.

The owner of the South Lodge said he likes the finished project and with his own house also in fine upkeep, the walk through the estate is looking like it did years ago when the place was owned by the Salts family. North Lodge has been refurbished in line with Hartley Property Trust's dynamic strategy of the regeneration of their substantial property interests in Yorkshire (made up in the main of mills and factories that once housed the Illingworth Morris textile empire). After spending £250,000 to renovate the Lodge and save it from ruin, as owners they put it up for rent and advertised it in a country property magazine.

I went to see the new occupants, a couple that come from Baildon originally with family in the Bingley area, who wanted to move back to this area from Stamford Bridge to ask them what it was like so far, living with a lot of Milner Fields history. Susan and Paul told me that their son in-law had mentioned the Lodge after seeing it being restored and they had also seen it in the magazine, so they came to have a look, liked it straight away and decided to rent it. In August they moved in, brought their furniture and started to settle down to life in North Lodge, Milner Fields. They knew some of the history about the area and are now starting to find out more but, as Susan said, she did not really expect so much interest from the people who use the walk through the estate. "Lots of people ask about the house and if we know anything about Milner Fields, but like everyone else we only know what we find out from talking and searching the web." I told them, "Just wait for summer and then you will really find out how busy the walk gets." People from all over the place come to see the ruins or just for a walk in the area and if Susan and Paul are thinking of doing any gardening, well! I think that more talking than digging will be done, so a lot of leaning on the new fence, drinking tea and answering questions will be the order of the day. "Well," they said, "we are a friendly couple and will do our best to help with any questions that we are asked. If we do not know the answers we will direct the people to the Saltaire history web site, so get ready all you people on the chat board".

The house is a lot different from how it was originally built, with a new two storey extension at the rear and mains running water. The last people to live in the Lodge were told to move out because the water was from a spring and was not clean enough! Now the house has all mod cons, double glazing, fitted kitchen, en-suite bathroom, down stairs toilet, central heating, a gas fire in the Gothic-arched fire place in the lounge, oak flooring throughout and a vaulted ceiling to the turret which casts light down the staircase and gives the house a feeling of grandeur. French windows lead out on to a paved patio and a double wooden garage stands by the side of the lodge and fits in well with the trees and surrounding woodland. New main gates have been fitted as well as a side gate which is not locked so people can still use the route through the estate. I think the architect, designers and builders have done a grand job, the lodge stands well at the Gilstead end of Milner Fields and I hope the new residents settle in and enjoy their new home.

So if any readers of this article are walking through the estate and see the new residents, don't be shy, stop, have a natter and pass on any history you know, to them so that they can try to answer all the questions they are surely going to get.

Ps: The owls are back as well. Susan said she could hear them twit t-wooing in the trees, so everybody sounds happy.

IDENTICAL CHURCHES – THE PLOT THICKENS by Jane Hedworth

Emerging from the History Club in March an elderly gentleman spontaneously started chatting as we both headed down the road to Baildon and Wrose respectively. He fondly reminisced about the days when (as I gather) there was a kind of 'show and tell' at the club. I mentioned that I hadn't been before and our conversation moved to the topic of the Saltaire 'There's an identical one in Italy', he church. interjected as I began to explain my interest. On my asking him where, he recounted that in the early 1940's (aged 14) he was working for Waites who were a building/joinery/decorating and undertaking firm near the Ring of Bells pub. Work was being done on the Saltaire church and my friend particularly recalls a Gilbert Waite. He insisted that the Waites team informed him that they had recently been out in Italy painting an identical church; unfortunately he couldn't say where. We chatted on a little before the gentleman turned off towards Baildon. A little research (with the aid of Colin and local trade directories) indicates that there was certainly a Waite and Son decorators in that area in 1938 and in 1958 there was a Waite Bros.

Trawling through pictures of all the churches in Italy is a little daunting – maybe someone out there has the time?
