WHEN WOOLSORTER'S DISEASE WAS RIFE AT T'MILL By <u>Roger Clarke</u>

Samuel Firth of Bradford died as a result of this disease in June, 1880.

The resulting inquest gave some indication of the hazards of his occupation. The woolsorter's first job was to open the sacks in which the fibre had been transported, thus releasing into the air all manner of noxious substances. English wool was regarded as a safe fibre to work with, but the raw product came from all over the world. The worst was Van mohair and a product called Persian, since their sacks contained many different grades of fibre, some evil smelling and wet.

Andrew Sutcliffe was a sorter and packer at Salts, and described how the only safe way to handle the bags was to put them to steep in hot water prior to their opening. The water should be hot, but the employers were concerned that if it were too hot it would damage the fibres. He also described the symptoms of the disease, which were the rapid onset of cold, shivering, vomiting and insensibility. There were no eruptions on the skin, but there were no nails left on the fingers after handling this material. He knew of several woolsorters at Salts who had died of these symptoms. The inquest brought in a verdict of death from accidental causes, and recommended that legislative measures should be passed dealing with the sorting of dangerous works. [Anthrax was not mentioned at this enquiry. It is known, however, that
