SIMPLY SALTAIRE SALE A SUCCESS

The "Simply Saltaire" exhibition and sale of artwork and photography at the United Reformed Church concluded on Spring Bank Holiday Monday with a grand auction. The services of **Maria Glot and colleagues from "Salts Walks"** were secured to run the event. In Victorian costume, with Mrs Ellin Dooley (aka Maria), a very common mill-girl, as auctioneer, the audience were soon bidding briskly for remaining items. In place of the usual bidders numbers, cards identifying Victorian diseases were held up by the audience, with "abscesses", "croup" and "colic" being the most prolific bidders.

The auction made a total of £980. Added to sales during the month-long exhibition, the total raised for the proposed Education Centre to be established in the Church rooms was in excess of £3,000. The organisers commented on the remarkable generosity of donors of work and of purchasers, reflecting the affection which the Church commands from villagers, as a centre for community activities. The event could not have been staged without the help of Saltaire Village Society, along with CNet, Grassroots and Incommunities funding.

GEORGE SALT'S STEAM CARRIAGE

From the Bradford Observer of July 18th, 1861, we discover that George Salt, Titus and Lady Caroline's second child, was twenty-six years old and already into boys' toys. He exhibited his steam carriage at a display of steam driven machinery. The comments of the reporter were that

"It was constructed for Mr Salt by Messrs Carret, Marshall and Co. of Leeds. It has accommodation for nine to twelve passengers. There is much ingenuity displayed in the design, but we question whether it is adapted for moving along our streets and roads without danger to itself and others".

Just like his father, George seems to have had an aptitude for everything mechanical (and expensive). Later he became an enthusiastic sailor and owned his own yacht, the "Oithona", which was usually moored at Scarborough and later in London. Wood and ivory turning were his brother, Titus Junior's, hobby. Much less expensive and less ostentatious. But remember that he also took great pride in designing his own house at Milner Field, where all the latest gadgets were fitted including electricity and telephones. In addition, Sir Titus, Titus Junior and Edward were enthusiastic orchid growers, and cultivators of exotic fruits, requiring expensive heating technology as well as considerable horticultural skills.

continued from p.1 The Street Sign Project was initiated in the year 2000 by Clive Woods, still remembered with great affection by so many people in Saltaire for his groundbreaking research into local history, his tireless efforts for the Tramway and, not least, as founder of the Village Society. The venture met with a heartening response and many signs had been replaced before problems of administration unfortunately coincided with Clive's failing health. Following his death in 2007, the Society decided that completion of the project, by then an official objective in the World Heritage Site Management Plan, would be a fitting tribute to his memory and, the enthusiastic with support of this newspaper and its readers. has devoted much of its energy to that end - an end now clearly in sight. "A RATHER POSITIVE YEAR" FOR VILLAGE SOCIETY (FRUSTRATION AND FARCE INCLUDED)

In his Chair's report to the Annual General Meeting of Saltaire Village Society (SVS) on the 3rd of last month, **Rob Martin** expressed his opinion that Saltaire has experienced "a rather positive year" during which some issues (among which he mentioned the announcement of the new Visitor Information Centre) "although frustrating have added a touch of farce".

On the issue of the Saltaire Roundabout, which has once again been a cause of major concern, Mr. Martin said he was very pleased at the progress which has been made. "A steering group of local councillors, council transport officers, consultants Arup and people from the community have met to discuss proposals for alleviating the problems with traffic," he explained. "This group are now nearing the end of their work after extensive public consultation and I look forward to the implementation of the plans, which are designed to make it just that little bit better. It has been a difficult process and the solutions will not be favourable to all of us. I hope that similar community involvement on all issues which affect us will become the norm."

Successes for the Society included its involvement with the Simply Saltaire exhibition and the Half Moon Café ("SVS fully supports the Cricket Club in its work to make the Half Moon a successful community enterprise") as well as the Street Sign Project, for which gratitude was expressed to all donors.

SALTAIRE LEARNING

The project which Mr Martin found most exciting, however, is the "work in progress" which has already brought together a wide range of people and organizations to set up educational resources for visitors to Saltaire, "not based just on Titus Salt, but the whole up-to-date Saltaire environment":

Saltaire Learning, set up last year at the instigation of World Heritage Site Officer Craig McHugh following widespread consultation about the need for such resources, is looking to be instrumental in organising local events on and around World Heritage Day, April 18th, 2011, (for which the theme is expected to be 'water'). Mr Martin, who was recently elected to chair the group, told the *Sentinet*. "It is hoped Saltaire Learning will do an "education" event on Friday 15th (it is the start of the school holidays on the Monday). My idea is to have events over the weekend and Monday organised by different groups in Saltaire.



Abbi Hobbs, who lives in Bingley and is a researcher at the University of York, is hoping to recruit a local focus group on the public perception of biobanks as part of a European social science research project led by the University of Vienna.
