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A SHOP AT THE HEART OF THE COMMUNITY

Roger Clarke calls in at 20/21 Titus Street

Better known in the Village as "the Spar shop", this has been a corner grocer's and bakery since 1879. However, since 1962 it has had only two owners. In 1962 it was owned by **Leslie and Reginald Hodgson**, brothers, who ran it for 29 years and 3 months. Reginald was the baker (up at 4am to bake the bread) and Leslie the confectioner and shop keeper. Reginald's Cornish pasties were the talk of the area, priced at one shilling. Small loaves were two and a half pence, large loaves four and a half pence, and teacakes were a penny. The shop became part of the Spar chain in 1967, and the brothers were able to offer groceries at very competitive prices because all the advertising, bulk buying and overheads (even down to providing paint for the outside of the shop) were taken care of by Spar. For some time they operated a mobile service using a van to trade door to door in the Coach Road area, a section of the business which, on its own had £100 per week turnover.

In 1992, **Raman and Ramila Lad** took over, and they continued to bake bread and confectionary there until 2006, when the preference of customers was for more pre-packed bread. They moved on to have a mixture of sliced, pre-packed and unsliced, unpackaged bread, the latter coming from an external bakers. Raman reflected how his customer base has changed in character as the social trends in the Village have changed, and his stock is much different too. The older customers have mainly left the Village, many into Care Homes or living with their families. These customers used to buy raw ingredients with which to cook their own menus. Since 2001, the local population has changed. Younger customers (25 to 35 year age range) now shop with him, and their tastes reflect the current fast-moving society. They want fast food such as frozen ready meals, fine wines, homemade samosas, and more unusual items which they can't easily get from supermarkets. Raman offers the kind of service which says "if we've not got it in stock, and if it's available, I'll have some for you tomorrow". I spent over an hour chatting and observing customers and what they bought. Most popular items seemed to be bread, milk, alcohol and cigarettes, but there were examples of the sort of specialist service which Raman had described. One lady wanted, and obtained, some candles for a cake, and a young man wanted some coriander (to make coriander soup for the evening meal). After a moment's hesitation, Raman disappeared into a back room and reappeared with a bunch, to the delight of his customer! Raman and Ramila stayed in the Spar group for 3 years, before trading independently. I was impressed with the couple's commitment to personal service to the community. They feel that the Village needs and deserves a reliable grocer on the doorstep. The shop continues much as it has always been run. There is no market research or price comparisons with competitors. They just stay open for as long as customers want them (8am to 10pm) and get to know their customers, and what they like, very well, providing a real local, neighbourhood resource based on reliability, good value and commitment.

Residents and visitors will have noticed the large flag flying at the Spar during the recent Festival. Although shops in Victoria Road had theirs up in good time, Raman and Ramila might well have missed out, owing to a misunderstanding over whether or not the shop had a flagpole holder, if not for the timely intervention of *Sentinel* reader **Dina Lad**. Dina brought the oversight to the attention of the Festival Committee as well as this newspaper, saying, "The Spar is one of the stores that is at the heart of Saltaire Village. The owners go out of their way on many occasions to help the elderly of our community and to any other residents, whenever they need a helping hand. They are such lovely people and have had the Store for many years." [The Spar was one of the very first outlets for the *Sentinel* and the interest and support which Raman and Ramila showed then, and have continued to show, for the paper is much appreciated.-Ed]

LOCAL HISTORY DVD IS FASCINATING MIXTURE

**Roger Clarke takes a good look at the new DVD,
"Saltaire - Caught on Camera" :**

Father and son team, **Colin and Ian Egglestone**, are enthusiastic restorers of archive movie films. They draw on material which is stored at Bradford Industrial Museum, and on local sources, to bring to life the history of Saltaire and district. Their most recent DVD is a fascinating mixture of images which reflect the area in the twentieth century. These include footage of Saltaire in the 1960s and 70s, and a view of the Milner Field as it is today. Particular events which receive attention are the 1953 Works Trip to Blackpool from Salts Mill; the Shipley Glen Tramway renovation and re-opening in 1982; the re-opening of Saltaire railway station in 1984; the Jowett car Diamond Jubilee in 1983; a Saltaire street party; the model railway based on Saltaire and the Mill; the first Saltaire Festival in 2003; and finally the recent opening of the Roberts Park renovation in 2010.

This is an hour's worth of entertainment for everyone with an interest in Saltaire. It is available at Salts Mill and at Peter Randall's barber's shop on Bingley Road.

Still available by the same duo, from Bradford Industrial Museum, is the film of the 1961 Bradford Trolley Bus Jubilee - a re-edit of the film originally put together by Stanley King and Roy Brook, showing trolley bus routes and the celebration of 50 years of trolleybuses in Bradford at the Thornbury depot.

My wife and I were in the Village on Sunday August 22nd, celebrating our Ruby wedding. We both worked at the library in the 1960's when the Institute was Shipley's central library and held our reception in the Glen room, courtesy of Shipley Council.
