So, if you feel you've overfilled your body and starved your exceptional mind, your New Year resolutions could include feeding your creative instincts. Why not make most of local venues? Of course Salts Mill and the Victoria Road galleries are well enough known to need little mention, except perhaps to note a new display of work by David Quirke in the gallery beyond Salts Mill's Diner and more spectacularly, on the third floor, new ipad images by Hockney projected onto the walls. Meanwhile, Art Parade on the corner of Victoria

Road and Albert Terrace has moved into artist's prints in addition to photographs and **Massarella's** continues to showcase constantly changing local art.

Perhaps less well-known exhibition space includes the Half Moon Cafe. where Anne **Davies** currently has Saltaire related work on display. The Butterfly Rooms on Gordon Terrace now has four exhibition rooms upstairs, with artists rotating on a six weekly basis. From January 15th it will be the turn of Dan Shiel (photography), Lis (ceramics) Holt Dave Starley (oil painting).

On the theme of seeing new perspectives; gasp (while getting your breath back from the climb) at a not-to-bemissed rooftop view of the Village from the upstairs back room.

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### CAROLINE STREET CLUB

Since October, 2009, the Caroline Street Club has been an outlet for the *sentinel*, and regular members have been keen to read up on local news.

Roger Clarke called in to talk to the people who help to keep it running:

For many years the Club has been a centre for entertainment in the Village. The sign above the door indicates that it was the HQ of the Amalgamated Engineering Union, which originally had premises in Stead Street, off Briggate, Shipley. Subscriptions were regularly collected by Mr Brotherton, a long serving member. The Club transferred to Saltaire in 1966, and was opened on October 13<sup>th</sup>, by JW Cameron OBE, the owner of a brewery which provided alcohol for the club. (Scottish and Newcastle was the other brewery involved in supplying the club.) There was a committee of 15 officials - President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, 3 trustees, and 8 committee members. A steward was appointed who served behind the bar (wife to assist).

Working-men's clubs were at the height of their popularity in the 1960's, and there were many well-known artists who appeared in them, going on to receive national and international acclaim. Saltaire locals can remember several who appeared at the Caroline Street Club. They included Charlie Williams, the Elizabethans (who later became Smokie), Kiki Dee, the Ray Ellington quartet, Ronnie Carroll, the Temperance Seven, and the Dave Lee Sound. There was also a special concert to commemorate the Aberfan Disaster.

The popular compere was Joe Belcher, who in the daytime ran a market stall selling fruit and vegetables in Shipley.

On September 27<sup>th</sup>, 1988 the name was changed to the Caroline Street Club. This information comes from **Anne Brayshaw** who is involved in running the Club, along with Acting Secretary **Dennis Holdsworth.** 

Dennis is a local lad, and in many ways is an old salt. He tells me that he joined the Navy in 1954, and spent two and a half years in the Service. His eventual reason for discharge was sea-sickness after 31 days continually suffering from the condition.

His family have strong links with Saltaire, and with one house in particular. The 1881 Census has Edwin (42) and Harriet (42) Holdsworth living at 41, Titus **Street**, and the family were then resident there across a number of generations. In the 1920s and 30s, Dennis's grandparents Sam and Zilla Holdsworth lived there. Sam was a worsted spinner and later an overlooker at Salts Mill, but Zilla never worked there. In 1938, Dennis and his parents moved from their house in Windhill to live at 41, Titus Street. Dennis's father, Maurice, was employed in the Salts Mill Estates Dept, and his mother was employed as a bobbin ligger. His Mum was also well known because for 30 years she worked at the fish and chip shop at No 38, Titus Street. Dennis also worked in spinning at Salts Mill after leaving school at 15, and stayed for five years before his interlude in the Navy. He returned to Salts, briefly, and remembers how many Hungarians were employed there in the 50s, following the Revolution. A change in career into wholesale grocery took him to Dartford, Orpington, Batley, and finally to Morrisons as Warehouse Distribution Director for 25 years, retiring 10 years ago. Dennis is now actively involved with Caroline Street Club.

The heady days of the 60s and 70s have now gone, but the Club remains a focus for social life in the Village. Increasingly it is being used as a function room by groups who are pushing ahead with Saltaire regeneration such as Saltaire Village Society and Saltaire Festival, as well as locals and regulars who just like to have a quiet drink in convivial company.

## ARCHITECTURAL GEMS OF JEWELLERY IN KATH'S DOUBLE

Kath Libbert's famous Jewellery Gallery on the second floor at Salts Mill is currently hosting two exciting exhibitions:

In *Cool Construct - New Kids On The Block* Kath promises us "Architectural gems on show in an architectural gem - Salts Mill!" As the name implies, lots of new talent is on display as all the jewellers involved are recent graduates.

Black & Bling brings a dash of dramatic glamour from four distinguished practitioners: David McCaul is a master goldsmith, and multiple award winner for his original highly and exquisite rings, which transcend the traditional format and Polly Wales, presents giant glitzy cocktail rings, each utterly unique with scattered throughout. The work **Jacqueline** of Cullen will already be familiar to many, as it can be seen worn by the evil character Narcissa Harry Potter and the Half Blood Prince and, more recently, adorning Deborah Meaden of TV's Dragon's Den, while Teri Howes employs a 'lowtech' production method which is a gentle, quiet rebellion against today's of 'instant culture everything'.

Both exhibitions run until January 30th.
