# SALTAIRE CELEBRATIONS OF WORLD HERITAGE

Introduced by Rob Martin, Chair, Saltaire Village Society and Saltaire Learning (a body that creates and promotes learning resources about Saltaire and the surrounding area for use by groups and individuals. It is the main organising group for the World Heritage Celebrations)

This is the first time that we have celebrated World Heritage Day in Saltaire, but I suspect it won't be the last. It seems to have caught the imagination of everyone and many individuals and groups are participating in the celebrations. Saltaire is a very lively place and seldom is there nowt to do. Rarely, though, do we celebrate what really makes Saltaire unique: We are a World Heritage site. It was Saltaire resident Clive Woods who did much of the work to get that inscription in December 2001. Ten years on we should have a party. Each World Heritage site has an agreed Statement of Outstanding Universal Value. Our SoOUV is that: "Saltaire represents culmination of а development of 'model settlements' as a solution to the urban problems of the industrial age". The SoOUV needs to be maintained over time, and any development needs to ensure that the attributes that convey the outstanding universal value are not threatened. That is the reason why many of us have been involved in campaigns against road by-passes and tunnels, why we participate in helping to plan improvements to the roads and streets, and why we respect the need for tighter planning regulations for our grade 2 listed properties. Sometimes I find it difficult to put into words what I feel about the concept of World Heritage and in particular its relevance to Saltaire. Recently I attended a meeting which was reflecting on the issues around the demonstration by the English Defence League in Bradford last August and my thoughts were on how we can, today and tomorrow, live together and form relationships to create an atmosphere of sharing. Saltaire residents, those who come to work in Saltaire and those who visit are "from all over the place". My hope is that our celebrations of World Heritage in Saltaire can bring about a connection between the UNESCO statement: "What makes the concept of World Heritage exceptional is its universal application. World Heritage sites belong to all the peoples of the world, irrespective of the territory on which they are located" and the lyrics written by Si Kahn: "It's not what you're given, it's what you do with what you've got."

# International World Heritage Celebrations Saltaire, Friday 15<sup>th</sup> to Monday 18<sup>th</sup> April 2011

The theme of UNESCO's International Monuments and Sites Day, (which Saltaire Learning, Saltaire Village Society and the rest of us have decided to extend into four) is water and, on the right,

Mike Clarke, of the Liverpool Leeds & Canal Society, tells us about the society and about the historic boat **Kennet,** (*pictured*, at Shipley in 1999), which will be moored on the canal next to Victoria Road and open to the public from Friday to Monday with displays about the Leeds Liverpool Canal, Saltaire and other canals and world heritage sites around the world.

Although Kennet will already be open, the **Celebrations Start** with a Reception in the Salt Building (opposite Victoria Hall) at 6.30pm on Friday, 15th.

The Leeds & Liverpool Canal has its own unique heritage — the type of boats which used the canal and their decoration, the design of the locks and bridges, and how the canal related to the areas it passes through. Fourteen years ago the Leeds & Liverpool Canal Society was set up to record this heritage and to encourage others to take a pride in it. We try to work with local groups, giving talks at local events or meetings. We have organised guided walks along the towpath, introducing people to the small historical details which can still be found. Some members have also been painting the mileposts along the canal, or fitting new bridge rollers which were used to prevent the towlines of horse-drawn boats from damaging bridge stonework. More recently, we have taken over the Kennet, one of the boats which operated on the canal. Built in 1947 to carry general cargo, she later became a maintenance boat, and was converted by British Waterways into an exhibition boat in 1985. As such, she was open to the public at places all along the canal, as well as on other canals in the north-west. Money for such promotion of canals became much reduced, and three years ago the Society offered to take Kennet to events using volunteers instead of paid staff. This was quite successful, so a year ago the Society was offered a five year lease by British Waterways, who are helping with an application for Heritage Lottery funding to conserve and improve the boat. Because of our commitment to the conservation of Kennet, British Waterways have now sold her to us, and we hope to have the Heritage Lottery funding in place in the near future. Kennet will be at Saltaire twice this year, once for the World Heritage weekend and then for the Arts Festival. Please come along and find out more about the canal's history and the Society. # Sentinel Folk HAVE THEIR SAY

**Roger Clarke** joined the *Sentinel* in 2004, having volunteered the idea of 'Saltaire Folk' – a regular series of "thumbnail sketches". Since then, he has been our most regular contributor and there is no doubt that his knowledge of local history and accessible writing style contribute greatly to the popularity of the paper. Fortunately, Roger is a keen walker, as it is nowadays entirely due to his nifty footwork that the *Sentinel* is so speedily on the shelves of our many outlets.

"What a great opportunity to use my retirement, and my interest in Saltaire, to write regular columns for the Sentinel. Pure self-indulgent pleasure. I first contributed in December, 2004, and have gone on to record the living history of Saltaire's regeneration by telling the stories of people who have made it happen, through my column called "Saltaire Folk". Equally important to me was to preserve the link with Victorian Saltaire via the newspaper accounts of the time. As well as producing some very humorous material, it preserves the language of the time which gives the Sentinel its unique Victorian flavour. Promotion of the Saltaire Archive at Shipley College was my final aim. Writing for the Sentinel has always been an interesting sideline from my "more serious" research into Saltaire's history. Imagine my pleasant surprise when I was recently sent an MA dissertation which included liberal references to my Sentinel contributions from a student I'd chatted with briefly. She got a distinction for her efforts. Well done Rebekah! And congratulations to James Duncan who has achieved his 100<sup>th</sup> Edition with pure hard work, attention to detail and a quirky, dry sense of humour. Brilliant, James."

**Pamela Reynolds** set up and continues to manage Saltaire's Village website, which can easily be found at: **www.saltairevillage.info** and is the only interactive website of Saltaire which relies on the input of the local community. It is run on a not-for-profit basis and is staffed by volunteers. The website and this newspaper, while each maintaining its own unique character, have always worked in close collaboration – as part of which, Pamela's technical expertise is an invaluable factor in the production of the *Sentinel*. Furthermore, thanks to Pamela, each issue of the paper is immediately available online - as is our entire archive.

"The Saltaire Village website went live in the autumn of 2005, a few sparse pages cobbled together. The **Saltaire Sentinel**'s generous Editor gave the go ahead for the **Sentinel** to be published online from January '06. The lead story by Eddie Lawler was: "Bandstand Tradition to be Revived". Two years later, issue No. 63, the headline ran: "Positive About The Park" a story detailing the felling of trees and the painful restoration of Roberts Park. Fast forward to April 2011 – a blooming park complete with bandstand and a full programme of music concerts for all to enjoy. And that's the **Sentinel's** beauty – it records the stresses, hopes and achievements of the people connected with Saltaire and of the place itself.

The Saltaire Village website grows every year. It currently has over 12,000 files on-line. This year alone, there have been over 160,000 pages viewed and more than 21,000 visitors. Downloads include The Saltaire Journal and the Street Map of Saltaire, (courtesy of Nemine Juvante Publications) and of course, the *Sentinel*. A wonderful team of people support the website by answering the many emails that come in. And, the great grandson of Sir Titus Salt, Denys, visits the website to read the *Sentinel* - which is the equivalent of a Royal Seal of Approval! Thank you, James, for allowing the *Sentinel* to be part of the website. I'm grateful and deeply honoured and I wish the *Sentinel* continued success."
