HISTORIANS HEADING HOME

On Thursday, 23rd of last month, well known local historians Dave Shaw and Roger Clarke arrived in Carlisle, having completed the first leg of their (truly historic) 280 mile walk from New Lanark to Saltaire.

New Lanark, a World Heritage Site just south of Glasgow, was established by banker and textile entrepreneur David Dale in 1785 as a cotton-spinning centre. Robert Owen joined his father-in-law in this venture in 1800 and set up a philanthropic co-operative centre and it has been established that Titus Salt already knew of this model community before building Saltaire. Dave came up with the idea of linking the two model industrial settlements in this way and the invitation to join him was enthusistically accepted by Roger, who shares his interest in walking and running, and had already worked with him to establish the Saltaire History Club and the Saltaire Journals. Both approaching seventy, the two local heroes also felt they had something to prove, to achieve the challenging objective "while we still can!" Aiming to cover fifteen miles a day, the trip would take at least eighteen days to complete; impossible to do as a block in busy diaries, so it was decided to tackle the journey in three stages – the next being to Settle. Dave is keeping a daily blog – which can be followed, courtesy of **Pamela** Reynolds, on the Saltaire Village Website at www.saltairevillage.info - the latest words from which are: "We're now pausing in our travels, to return to Saltaire for a couple of weeks, but look forward to resuming our journey from New Lanark to Saltaire in July. To everyone we've met on our travels so far thank you for your company and your hospitality!"

Fellow historian **David King**, who completed the team, providing transport for this first leg and thus ensuring that the two walkers would not have to carry all their possessions for the full trip, as well as providing more flexibility in finding suitable accommodation along the way, says: "I believe the magnitude of what they have both achieved is worthy of recognising and recording, as I know they would not wish to put praise on themselves. **Well done Dave and Roger. Here's to the next two legs and the eventual completion of the journey in Saltaire!**"

MATTERS OF LIFE AND DEATH BUT NOT ALL DOOM AND GLOOM AT GALLERY

Matters of Life and Death is the name of the latest exhibition at the Kath Libbert Jewellery Gallery on the second floor of Salts Mill, running from July 7th until September 25th. The show, which has come together as a result of Kath's trip to Schmuck, the prestigious International Art Jewellery competition in Munich, explores the responses of nine international jewellery artists to the proliferation of natural disasters and man-made destruction in our world and features some "fantastic" work which she hopes will both provoke and inspire visitors. Charred carbon, iron jaws and sliced silver swords are all in evidence, but Kath reassures us that "Matters of Life and Death isn't all doom and gloom!" Humourous highlights include Akiko Kurihara's playful, "punning" pieces and Peter Vermandere's gargoyle inspired pearl pins, 'Emotions for the Advanced'. As an interactive element to the exhibition, visitors will be invited to be photographed wearing pieces and to record their response on an installation that will become an integral part of the exhibition. There will also be two provocative videos on show by renown installation artist Gisbert Stach. A Collectors Event, with keynote speakers to accompany the exhibition, will be held in September. WHO WAS THE LAST LOCAL BLACKSMITH? - THE PLOT THICKENS!

Last month, Kevin Archer, suggesting that a certain William Pedley of Oastler Road may have been the last blacksmith in Bradford, asked if our readers had any other ideas.

David Brazendale, General Secretary of Saltaire Angling Association, was quick to respond with the following contribution:

William Pedley was NOT the last blacksmith in Bradford. This honour must surely go to a blacksmith (name unknown) who had premises near Baildon Bridge weir, probably on the site now used as a coach maintenance depot. I moved (with my parents, now sadly both deceased) into the house I live in now at the aged of 5 in 1961, although I have not lived there continuously. I remember at the age of between 6 and 8 visiting this blacksmith with my father to get wrought iron gates made and seeing the place at work. The blacksmith was there until shortly before the buildings were demolished; date uncertain but in the mid to late sixties or early seventies. (We moved here from Australia so it is a fairly distinct memory.)
