POTATO DAY

Saturday, 18th of this month is West Yorkshire Organic Group's Potato Day from 10am until 2pm in the Exhibition Hall on Exhibition Road.

More than three dozen varieties will be on offer, most of which are organic, with a good selection of heritage and specialist varieties that are not readily available in the shops, and all tubers at 15p each. There will also be stalls selling organic compost and a side variety of organic seeds. Refreshments will be available.

The initiative of a local group has resulted in £50,000 being made available to invest in its efforts to establish Saltaire as a truly sustainable community. **Susan Dalgety reports:** Sustainable Saltaire, a new community interest company, which began sub-group as a of Saltaire Village Society, has secured the grant from the Government's Local Energy Assessment Fund (LEAF) and will use it to develop a ten year blueprint to make the Village more energy efficient and reduce its carbon footprint.

The first phase will involve engagement with the local community and include an audit of homes and businesses to assess energy demand, provision of information for residents to help them reduce their fuel bills and a feasibility study of renewable energy installations.

CO2Sense, a consultancy that helps Yorkshire businesses reduce carbon emissions, will be involved in carrying out the work.

The funding will run until the end of March, by which time it is hoped that a long term plan for carbon reduction and energy saving will have been agreed.

Andy Brown of Sustainable Saltaire said: "Just as Saltaire was a model for Victorian industrial villages, then we can be a model for sustainable communities of the future. We hope people will join us." To get involved go to www.sustainablesaltaire. org

IAN WATSON joins Roger Clarke's SALTAIRE FOLK

Last month, **Roger Clarke** reviewed the recently published 'The Land Acquisitions of Titus Salt in Shipley and Baildon' by Ian Watson. Here, Roger provides some interesting background information on the author:

Ian Watson admits that many of the new and unique insights arising from land acquisitions came as a complete surprise to him. He had been pursuing a completely different project as he researched his own family history. His family had roots in Cononley and in Horsforth, and he soon began to look at tithe maps and enclosure documents relating to this, refining his skills in research methods as he did so. Archives in Bradford, Wakefield, Leeds and the National Archive Centre in London brought him face to face with the dusty plans, maps and documents of the Quarter Sessions (details of all cases brought before the Courts), some of which had not been consulted since they were first deposited 150 years ago. Seeing the name Titus Salt deflected Ian from his original task and led him to the discoveries in this, his latest book.

Ian's family eventually settled in Saltaire. His mother was born in Fanny Street, and he was born at 31, Titus St. Many of his relatives worked in Salts Mill, and he started work there in the Warping Section on leaving school. He remained there for three years before joining Grattan's in Bradford as a warehouseman, a position which he retained for forty years, eventually retiring in 2007.

But it was his interest in local history which sustained his enthusiasm, dating from the time of his father's death in 1957. Having attended a course on research methods with Gary Firth, he and several other students formed the Shipley Local History Society which ran from 1985 to 2004. Ian was secretary there, and published his "In the Shadow of the Rosse" in 1989. His family had moved to Oastler Street (now demolished) and Ian was keen to chronicle the history of the site and the changes which took place there in the 1960s. The group also supported the publication of Bill Hampshire's "Water Mills of Shipley" and a survey of Low Well Mills in 1985.

A 2:1 degree in Local History Studies at Bradford University in 2001 set the seal on Ian's academic success, and gave him the confidence to undertake several projects including the history of Shipley School Medical Authorities, turnpike roads in the Shipley area, and the history of Briggate. He is currently undertaking a major cataloguing of the Saltaire Archive at the Resource Centre of Shipley College, and it is the College which has printed his most recent publication.

Meanwhile, he continues his interest in walking, which comes from years of running for buses to get to Grattan's by 7am daily, he says!

I am sure that we will see more in print from Ian, and he remains a valued colleague in Saltaire history circles.

We are grateful to Mr. **Richard Coomber**, who passed on to us the following, which he found in the Huddersfield Chronical of May 7th, 1870.

FISH CULTURE IN THE AIRE - Mr. Titus Salt, jun., has been very successful this year in his trout-hatching operations at Saltaire. We are informed that during the last ten days he has turned out 15,000 young trout, nearly all of the Malham Tarn breed. They have been set free as follows:- 9,000 into Milner Field Beck, running into the river Aire; 4,000 into the Aire; and 2,000 into the lake at Crow Nest. Mr. Salt still has some 1,500 or 2,000 young fishes left, and intends to keep 300 or 400 up during the summer, the remainder being placed in the river in the course of a few days. Those already turned into the waters named would be about 1in. to 1½ in. long when freed. Since they were hatched the fish have eaten many ounces of bullocks' liver boiled hard and grated.

THE STORY OF THE SENTINEL By Roger Clarke



The origins of the *Sentinel* are to be found in the childhood of its editor. James Duncan. He had always wanted to run a newspaper. The first idea came from watching Yogi Bear cartoons on TV in which there is а publication called "The True News". It took his fancy as a child. Later, a major influence came from watching a Western in which villains tried to take over a small town but were thwarted by the newspaper editor who used the written word to mobilise the townsfolk against them. The idea of becoming a pen-slinger rather than a gun-slinger was born. A community hero! The reality was that he produced "The Weekly Carbon", was which circulated to relatives and Not concerned friends. with local issues, it dealt more with world affairs and there was not much editorial comment. This kept James occupied, on and off, until his early teens – by which time he was using his first typewriter (above). Then the dream seems to have disappeared - only to resurface dramatically some decades later -

THE BIG SALTAIRE KNIT

Keith Lander is looking for people who would be willing to help with a new project, 'Knit Saltaire', starting up now and finishing in time for the Saltaire Festival this September. The project aims to draw visitors' attention to Saltaire's woolen trade, local and World heritage in a creative, fun and quirky way in addition to everything else that helps visitors enjoy Saltaire's heritage. The idea is to particularly make a physical/visual impact during the festival, even if it is for just one day. Any ideas will be welcome, but here are just some of the ways you could be involved and help out: - Knit bunting, possibly in a group, or collection of local groups and individuals, each person doing a few flags depicting something of Saltaire's hertiage. You could even do ones representing local Saltaire organisations - a chance to help further knit our local groups together!. If permission is given, the bunting could go along Victoria Road and other places - Knit a lampost or a tree - Knit the canal bridge (ie the railing) - Knit around buildings and other places of known heritage - Knit a hat or a scarf to go round the lions outside Victoria Hall and Alpacas in Roberts Park! - Knit your street (agree with your neighbours first!) e.g knitting the front doors (the doorknobs, handles and door knockers and even the letterboxes all adorned)! - Set up or join in with an existing 'Knit-in' group - help people to learn to knit or work with textiles to produce collages.

Relevant permissions would need obtaining first and of course it all needs to be done carefully but for now let Keith know if you want to get involved whoever you are, man or woman, young or adult and whether you can knit or not. Whether you are a local arts practitioner or whether you've never picked up some needles but want to.
