WURLITZER REMINDER

A list of events being organised by the Cinema Organ Society is available at the Victoria Hall and the Information Visitor Centre. **Peter Rushton** The controversial plan for a hydro electric scheme at Saltaire Weir will be the subject of a Public Consulation at the United Reformed Church on

Thursday, July 5th.

Proposals, which involve the installation of an Archimedes Screw type turbine and. it is claimed, could reduce carbon emissions (for the city of Bradford) by 23.000 tonnes over the next forty years, met with approval from the Council at a recent meeting of the Shipley Area Committee (held in Baildon) – but local opinion remains divided. Richard Sabey, Director of Sustainable Saltaire. is of the opinion that: "The Council's scheme, although not a community project, is a first positive step towards Saltaire becoming a centre of sustainable living."

But **Les Brook**, of *Friends of Roberts Park*, while acknowledging that "The need for progress on green energy is undeniable, as is the generating potential of Saltaire weir," adds:

"Too many questions still remain unanswered. Without further work and without engaging the community, the current proposal has the potential to set back the development of sustainable energy.

The **Sentinel** s Roger Clarke concludes: "This is likely to be a big story because the Green case is compelling and the Heritage case is equally convincing, especially when there has not been adequate consultation with the public over the latter." The Consulatation will

THE MASON CONNECTION

Donation of a copy of a legal document such as an affidavit (a sworn statement to be used in Court) sounds boring, but that which was recently donated by **John Collins** (General Manager in the Estates Division of Illingworth Morris plc between 1975 and 1997) was far from it.

Mention a Board Room dispute at Salts Mill in 1981 and it sounds dull. Add **Pamela Mason, wife of film star James Mason**, and it begins to promise more drama. The truth is that this story was followed in the Press like a soap opera.

Pamela was the daughter of Isidore Ostrer, whose large fortune was made on the stock market, in banking and in the film industry. He also owned 46% shares in Illingworth Morris, owners of Salts Mill. When he died in 1975, Pamela became his sole executrix and had control over these shares. She was used to getting her own way in business, and began to intervene in the administration of the Mill. Her ideas ran counter to the way in which the Mill directors saw the future, and she attempted to vote out the two top directors. Other members of the Ostrer family objected to her behaviour and wanted her to proceed with the sale of the family shares. Her step-sister Isabella took this matter to Court, and swore two affidavits which made the case for her complaint. The copy of Pamela's affidavit which is now in the Archive is her response to Isabella's accusations.

Pamela and her son, Morgan were voted off the Board in October, 1981. She never accepted that the voting was legal, but never contested it in Court.

Entrepreneur Alan Lewis acquired Pamela's 46% stake in the business in 1983. In 1987, the mill was sold to Jonathan Silver.

The case received so much publicity because Pamela was such a well known and flamboyant figure, used to conducting her life in the glare of the Press and TV. Her marriage to James Mason was well known to the public, and she was a film actress in her own right. They were very different personalities. James was dour and taciturn but Pamela was garrulous – described as having been "vaccinated with a phonograph needle". Their marriage was to last for 23 years until they divorced in 1964. James eventually died in Switzerland in 1984. They had 2 children, daughter Portland and son Morgan.

The Masons made a number of films together and were also in TV, Pamela starring in her own chat show in America.

There is much information contained in the affidavit about Pamela's expensive lifestyle and tastes (she always travelled first class and stayed in the best hotels), and of her successful business career in the USA.

Pamela died in Beverley Hills, California in 1996 aged 80 years.

David and Jonathan Starley ON THE TRAIL OF THE FLYING SQUIRREL

A recent school project for my son at Saltaire Primary School provided an opportunity to look into a less well known aspect of local history. In the years prior to World War 1 Scott motorcycles were renowned for their innovative design and powerful two-stroke engine. Surviving examples including the famous "Flying Squirel" can be seen at Bradford Industrial Museum. Although the firm's logo included the location "Shipley", several descriptions of the bikes suggested a Saltaire origin. But where was the factory? For once the internet provided no clues and young Jonathan was forced into more traditional research techniques. Peter Randall, always a great source of local knowledge, was able to suggest that most of the factory was now gone, with Spinning Mill Court built on the site. However, part survived on the Hirst Wood Road Industrial Estate. We visited this site and were fortunate to be invited inside by the managing Director, Glyn Brown, of the present occupiers Archerdale (clearly still doing good business, in fasteners for the construction industry). The interior of the factory, with its distinctive north-facing roof lights, matches closely some 1926 photos of the Scott assembly shops. (Scott's occupied the site from 1912.) The early innovative approach of the firm failed to develop after the founder left in 1918, and in 1952 production on the site ceased, a much diminished output being continued from Birmingham.
