ROGER'S GRAVEYARD SHIFT

The first of a three part series by Roger Clarke

This series of articles has nothing to do with working nights or wearing a shroud. It's about that inevitable part of a historian's task which occasionally takes me into cemeteries - which far from being grave places can actually be fascinating and fun. The saddest thing is that I've even arranged trips to them for visiting friends, who begin by humouring me but then find themselves bitten by the bug.

I take them first to Fulneck in Pudsey, Leeds, which is a model village predating Saltaire. It's a Moravian settlement with a central religious core. The Moravians were dissenters from the Roman Catholic Church in the 15th century, and their initial base in Yorkshire was at Smith House at Lightcliffe, near Halifax - which gives us an immediate link with Titus Salt who was their neighbour when he lived at Crow Nest. He would have known of the Fulneck experiment before embarking on Saltaire. Fulneck was a satellite settlement in 1744, and stuck to Moravian principles of communal living, mutual dependency and self sufficiency. Married couples occupied family houses but single or widowed individuals were housed in single sex houses. Their efforts at self sufficiency were not always successful, and their attempts to make cloth production their mainstay ended in failure. However, their bakery was to ensure their survival. They created a lovely little 22 acre village in which the houses, streets, church, shop, Temperance Hotel and cemetery are as they were in the 18th and 19th centuries. Just as in Saltaire, a visit is like stepping back But Fulneck is even quainter, because today it's less into the past. commercialised than Saltaire, although two of the cottages have been converted into a small museum and the shop is still open. The school is now a very successful private boarding school from Nursery to Sixth Form.

The cemetery is known as **God's Acre**, the Brethren are buried on one side and the Sisters on the other, and my main reason for visiting is that **everyone has the same size headstone which is laid flat on the ground.** The eerie sound of horns accompanies funerals and the wearing of black is not allowed – "departure into the Arms of our Saviour is rather a cause for Joy than for Grief." No prizes for guessing where we're heading next on our graveyard gambol. It couldn't be more different.

KERBSTONE MYSTERY

I have had an enquiry from a tourist from Twickenham, who is also a geologist. He recently visited Saltaire and noticed that on the kerbstones were marks chiselled into the stone. Some were arrows, others diamonds, and others were letters; especially "S"s. He has noticed that they are in other parts of the country, too, and thinks that there are at least fifty different symbols used. Have a look at the kerbstones around the village to find examples. Does anyone know what they mean or why someone took the trouble to put them there? Let us know where you find them and what they might be – either through the Saltaire Bookshop, where staff will pass the information, or by e-mail [see front page].

HATTIE DOES IT YET AGAIN

For the fourth year in succession Hattie **Townsend** staged a children's parade as part of the Saltaire Festival, ably supported by Martin Biil, assistant manager of Roberts Park. This year it celebrated 2,000 years of Yorkshire history, from pre-history to the present day. The Titus Salt School enacted the giant of Rombald's Moor; St Walburga's the Vikings; Lapage School, Bradford the Romans; Glenaire School the Normans; Wycliffe School the Age of Discovery; and Saltaire School the Age of Invention. Over a thousand young people paraded around the park, and then gathered on the playing field to hear the Phoenix Marching Band play rousing tunes. Prizes were given for the best costumes and presentations. crowds were addressed by Major Stanley Hardy, Deputy Lord Lieutenant of West Yorkshire on behalf of Her Majesty the Queen, and guest of honour was Mr Denys Salt, great grandson of Titus Junior. Eddie Lawler lustily led the singing of "On Ilkley Moor Bah'tat" and conducted the children with the aid of a stick of rhubarb. Despite a bitingly cold wind, the enthusiasm of the children was overwhelming. They were a credit to the staff from all six schools involved and the work of visiting artist Amanda Freeman. Hattie once again provided the inspiration, creativity and direction for the parade, and Martin's practical organisation ensured that Roberts Park was the ideal venue. **Roger Clarke**
