LAST OF THE LANTERN SLIDES

The last two Sentinels have provided an account of Titus Junior's magic lantern slide show of his trip to the Holy Land. In the final episode of this series, we hear that his presentation was not well attended.

"We have heard of a very considerable number in Shipley and elsewhere, who were prevented from being present at the lecture, owing to an impression sent abroad that the place would be uncomfortably crowded, which we hope will not be the case again. If tickets had been previously disposed of this would have been prevented. It would be well, we think, if Mr Salt could be induced to re-deliver his lecture. Could it not be included amongst the attractions at the Soirees in Easter?" However, word got around and two days later he tried again with more local views:

Treat to the Young Folks

"Titus Salt, Esq., also gave an entertainment to the young people of Saltaire, on the evening of Saturday, 18th March, when upwards of 1,500 assembled, at his invitation, in the large hall of the Club. The entertainment consisted of a very large assortment of views, which were reflected upon the large screen by the oxy-hydrogen lime light lantern. Mr Salt described the more important views, and the children sang several hymns during the evening. When the views of the more important places of local interest were reflected upon the screen, the excitement became intense, and when the portrait of Sir Titus Salt, Bart, appeared on the screen, it burst forth in repeated rounds of applause, terminating in three cheers for Sir Titus. At the close of the entertainment, a vote of thanks was carried with acclamation to Mr Salt for his kindness, which he acknowledged, and the meeting was brought to a close by singing the National Anthem."

These accounts appeared in the "Saltaire Monthly magazine - A Miscellany of Local and Useful Information for the People". Price one penny. Communications for the Editor to be sent to the Saltaire Magazine Box in the vestibule at the New Institute." Copies could be obtained from Abraham Holroyd (36, now 79, Victoria Road), and Peter Hargreaves (32, Shirley Street). Holroyd described himself as "bookseller, bookbinder, stationer, periodical and newsagent" and Hargreaves as "Grocery and Stationery Warehouse – general provisions merchant, stationer and bookseller."

There were other outlets for the magazine in Shipley, Bradford and Keighley. All in all, a more ambitious version of the Sentinel! I wonder if it, too, achieved its 10th Anniversary?

Stories from World War One **Private Albert Webb**

In August 1915, the First

World War had been going on for a year. On the morning of Monday 9th, the King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry had engaged with the enemy at Hooge, Belgium, following in bombardment of enemy positions on the Sunday evening. In a letter home, Private Ernest Theobold, of Shipley, previously described how he was one of a group of men in the trenches. Following long hours of fighting: "After a bit of dinner, I took my boots off (my feet were soaking wet) and laid down on the floor of our dug-out. A shell came through the roof and burst. I came off luckiest of all". In fact Private Theobold suffered flesh wounds to his leg. Less fortunate was Private Albert Webb, who was killed by the explosion. Private Webb was a 22 year-old who had worked as a boy in the offices of Salts Mill. He was attached to the KOYLI having enlisted with the Shipley Detachment of the Royal Army Medical Corps, and had been on active service for four months. He was unmarried, & the only son of Mr & Mrs Albert Webb, of 9. Jane Street, Saltaire. He is buried at Talana Farm Cemetery, in Belgium.



Saltaire History Explorers GO UNDERGROUND

Many historic sites have associated stories of long lost tunnels. where soldiers beneath dug castles or monks visited girlfriends, or parliamentarians and royalists avoided each other. Surely a World Heritage site, like Saltaire, must have some underground spaces to explore.

There are the Victorian waste water drains, which pre-date the famous London sewers of Joseph Bazalgette, but these weren't an attractive option. Two better options were marked on an early twentieth century survey map. One tunnel connects the Institute with the Technical School (now Victoria Hall & Exhibition Building), but it's now unsafe. A second, between the Mill and what is now Shipley College's Mill building, had a very logical purpose. It allowed Sir Titus's workers an easy 'passage' from the mill gate directly into the canteen for a nutritious meal and, presumably equally swiftly, back to their work place. We'd seen the locked door often enough, but could we look in? Thankfully a letter to Robin Silver and the key and assistance of security guard Tom gave us access. As warned, we found it to be very much a storage area these days, bricked up at the College end and not suitable for regular visitors, but with a little imagination we could almost hear the clogged footsteps of earlier mill-workers on their way to and from their lunch break.

NICK'S NEW BOOK FOR TEENAGERS

Here is a book designed to help teenagers to improve their vocabulary and understanding of the written word. It is part of the Helbling Languages graded reading scheme. level 5.

Saltaire resident artist Nick Tankard, and author Elspeth Rawstron, who now lives in Istanbul, have combined their considerable talents to produce "Mystery at the Mill", a story located in Salts Mill and on the Leeds/Liverpool canal.

The fictional characters are Caterina and Jake in 2012, and Emily, her friend Grace and her boyfriend James in 1869. All are teenagers, and their action-packed stories unfold, mirror each other and interlink. It all begins when Caterina finds her great-great grandmother's diary in the attic and reads Emily's story. The serious theme of the book is that children were, and still are, exploited in the workplace producing textiles and clothing. In addition to the story, students are set Before and After reading activities to help with understanding, as well as glossaries on each page to explain unfamiliar words, background information, fact files and pointers for project work. Both teachers and students can use the Hebling "e-zone" online resources based on the book's contents. The book also comes with an audio CD, enabling students to check their work. But for me the book is a must on my shelves because of its location.


