WORLD HERITAGE HELEN ON SITE By Roger Clarke

Saltaire's new World Heritage Officer Helen Thornton's last post was in Leeds as Head of Site Development with the Museums and Galleries Department, where she had responsibility for developing Kirkstall Abbey Visitor Centre, Temple Newsam House, and the new City Museum; all multi-million pound schemes involving staff recruitment, business planning, project management, securing funding, customer care and site protection. Helen is originally from the Wirral, and it was work experience at the Merseyside Maritime Museum while still at school which determined her choice of career. Her degree in History and Archaeology led to a year spent in Liverpool Museum's Department of Archaeology and Ethnology, followed by a period at Rotherham Museums Service. Then employment with the North West Museums Service gave her experience of responsibility for planning and co-ordinating regional developments in government sponsored initiatives. This and another government funded post extended her skills even further. At Manchester Museum she gained much experience in managing Lottery funded projects and the operational side of running a successful visitor attraction. After just a few weeks in post in Saltaire, Helen is aware of the similarities and differences between this and her previous employment. She knows that Saltaire is not a museum, and that it functions through the co-operation of a number of independent organisations and interest groups. She has experience in working with History Societies, Civic Trusts and Friends of Museums and Galleries. In Saltaire the interest groups are more numerous and diverse, alongside Bradford Council's responsibilities for conservation and heritage protection. It will be a new experience to help in the process of them working most effectively together. Helen is aware that the Council now has to review the Management Plan for Saltaire, and this presents an opportunity to engage and consult with different groups in participating in planning for the future. Apart from her transferable business skills, Helen brings enthusiasm, energy and excitement to her new role in this unique village, with which she is admittedly smitten.

SCOTT MOTORCYCLE CENTENARY CELEBRATION SPARKED BY Sentinel

The distinctive sound of vintage Scott Motorcycles was once more heard in Saltaire last month, as members of the Scott Motorcycle Owners club processed through the village, writes David Starley. The event marked the centenary of the opening of the Scott factory off Hirst Wood Road - built to fulfil the demand for Scott's after the innovative bike's TT winning successes. The event was sparked after members of the club read about the survival of part of the factory in *The Sentinel* last year. After a welcome lunch organised by Glyn Brown, director of Archerdale, the company which occupies the surviving premises, the club members rode on to Undercliffe cemetery. There a wreath was laid to commemorate the 90th anniversary of the death of the brilliant engineer Alfred Angas Scott, the founder of the company.

World War One

James and Horace Robinson

Mr. & Mrs. William Robinson of 15 Albert Terrace, Saltaire must have been proud but concerned parents when six of their seven sons served their country in World War One. Walter, Tom, Fred and Ben thankfully survived the war, but sadly both James and Horace died. The seventh son Jack was too young to fight, being only eight when war broke out. James was a hairdresser working for Demos Barraclough at Bingley Road (15 Gordon Terrace) when he was called up in October 1916. He was with the 16th Battalion Prince of Wales Own (West Yorkshire) Regiment (1st Bradford Pals). Going to France early in 1917 he was soon badly wounded. In March he was Graywingwell transferred to Hospital in Chichester. Despite the best efforts of the hospital staff, James died on April 3rd.

On April 9th his coffin was transported from his residence at 19 Whitlam Street, Saltaire on a gun carriage. Crowds lined the route to Nab Wood Cemetery where he was buried. He left behind a widow and a young son. Horace was a wool warehouseman before he joined the 6th Battalion Duke of Wellington's West Riding Regiment.

He died on November 1st 1918, when his battalion was involved in capturing the city of Valenciennes in Northern France. He is buried at the Maing Communal Cemetery. He left behind a widow, Hannah of 21 Edward Street, Saltaire.

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VISIT BY JAMIE ROBERTS KEEPS FAMILY LINK ALIVE

Jamie Roberts, great, great grandson of Sir James Roberts, was in Saltaire on August 6th - and made a great impression, before walking off with three alpacas!







Jamie owns the Kilnsey Park estate, which includes the Kilnsey Park visitor attraction, in the Yorkshire Dales, the 35th anniversary of which coincides with the 120th anniversary of Sir James taking over the running of Salts Mill. As an appropriate celebration (as well as to publicise a birthday party at Kilnsey Park), Jamie embarked on a walk connecting the two venues, suitably attired in Victorian garb and accompanied by the animals, whose own ancestors played such a pivotal role in the fortunes of the Roberts and Salt families. The alpacas, which will take up residence at Kilnsey, were provided by the prize-winning breeders at Carlshead Farm near Wetherby.

Today, Sir James, whose intervention saved the Mill from bankruptcy, is best remembered locally for the park which bears the family name, and for the statue of Sir Titus there, which he sponsored (110 years ago).

ROLL BACK THE CARPET APPALACHIAN ANNIVERSARY

Roll Back the Carpet Appalachian Dance side formed in the early 1990s when we had to clear a carpeted floor in our founder's home to practice! Since then we've moved to the Victoria Hall in Saltaire and accumulated, made up or adapted Appalachian dances, mostly in the 'Green Grass' style. It is now 21 years since we started at Victoria Hall & we will be celebrating this anniversary with a range of other traditional dance sides from the local area including Longsword, Rapper, Cotswold and North West on Saturday September 14th.

In 2012 Roll Back the Carpet learned of an historical link between Saltaire and the Appalachian Mountain region of the US. The Saltaire History Club invited our members to a symposium about Titus Salt junior and his relatively short-lived business interest in coal and iron mining near Dayton Tennessee. Earlier in the year two members of the Society visited the area as guests of Bob Fulcher, the superintendent of the long distance Cumberland Trail. They were enthused by the locality and its music as well by the mining links. Their host happened to be a keen banjo player and has been recording many of the local traditional songs. The Cumberland Trail runs through Dayton and the now historical Salt's mining site. It was fascinating to learn how much of the business venture was controlled from Saltaire.
